Opposite Chainbridge Road - The original farm house, which faces south, was once three storeys but reduced in the early 1900's.

HILL FARM HOUSE



One of many past farms in Lound. Looking north up Town Street towards the Village Hall.

The Village Hall was once a Wesleyan Methodist Chapel built in 1834 later to become the Village Hall in 1934

Adjacent to the Reading Room,
known for its impressive grape
vines along its frontage.

READING ROOM

Originally built as a non-conformist 'Independent' chapel in 1816. The land it stands on was donated to the village by the residents of Lound Hall. Today, this building is an essential storage space for the village hall.





LOUND HALL

Adjacent to the village cross roads is Lound Hall, a Georgian three storey house built in the early 1800's.

Converted to a nursing home for the elderly in the 1990's

Lound cross roads looking northwards with 'Alpha House' in the foreground and the war memorial and 'Cote' farm house on the left behind the horse chestnut tree.






ALPHA HOUSE

THE OLD VILLAGE SHOP

'Franchise House' was once the village post office and local general store. Closed in the 1990's with the garages and the bus shelter demolished for a new build in 2000.

WILLOW COTTAGE

In the 1800's willow was extensively grown on drained land east of the village. Collected and brought to 'Willow Cottage' for soaking, stripping and preparation for the basket makers of Sheffield.





WILLOW COTTAGE OUT BUILDINGS



Out buildings were once busy workshops for the processing of willow in the large soaking tanks behind the geese, ready to be transported to Sheffield for basket making.

TURNER'S FARM BUILDINGS

Looking north with past farm buildings on the left, once owned by Turner's of 'Highfield Farm'. The farm buildings were converted to private dwellings in the late 1990's.

On the right, 'Farthings' cottage. As with many properties the railings were removed for the last war effort.

'BELMOOR' AND 'DOWNLEA' COTTAGES

Adjacent to 'Farthings' is 'Belmoor' cottage which was once the local cobbler's and butchers shop.

On the left, 'Downlea' the old village Post Office.

‘Downlea’ the old village post office in the early 1900’s with a prominent sign promoting the British Army on horse back.






ALPHA COTTAGE

CREW YARD


A broken down crew yard and buildings of 'Alpha Farm' once owned by the Rickles family. In the late 1980's it was brought back to life following a major conversion project into private dwellings.





NEATHOLME LANE BARN

Located behind 'Black Rabbit Cottage' on the left at the start of Neatholme Lane. Demolished late 1990's.

ST. ANNE'S CHURCH



2008

St. Anne's church was built in 1859 and is situated at the northern end of the village. It was converted in the early 1990's to a private house.

The bell of St. Anne's resides at St. Bartholomew's Church, Sutton-cum-Lound.





CHERRY TREE FARM

Early days of 'Cherry Tree Farm' with the Methodist Chapel in the background.

Although out of sight, the Paddocks behind the Chapel was built in 1971 and the Pinfold houses to the right were built in the late 1970's.





METHODIST CHAPEL



Primitive Methodist Chapel dated 1836 once having an extension built in 1903 to combine both worship and school room.

Converted to a private dwelling in the 1990's.





VILLAGE OUTING



Lound Village children and parents having a fun Sunday outing in a motorised charabanc in the early 1900's.
