

Reading Room—Part 1

The Reading Room is the building in the corner of Lound Nursing Home garden on Town Street. It is thought to be one of the oldest buildings in Lound dating back to 1816 when it was built as a non-conformist independent chapel.

The building has been used for many different functions in the past. At present it is the home for the Village Archive, also for storing the Marquee and party tent for hiring out, along with other equipment used for events organised by the Village Hall Committee. Before its present use it was the Village Hall even though it is really tiny, village social events took place there including the Village Dance. There is still the open fire in place but no chimney remaining. The Reading Room name probably came from this period when villagers came to read a shared newspaper and catch up with the local gossip.

Earlier, when it had been a Chapel is probably when the wooden panelling around the lower half of the inside walls was installed. But the mystery is, was it used for another purpose after it was a chapel as a door was bricked up on the Town Street side before the interior was panelled out!

100 Years Ago...



On a beautiful summer's day, Sunday 14th August 1921, a large group of people gathered to witness the Honourable Mrs Huntsman of Lound Hall unveil our newly erected War Memorial.

The obelisk of grey Scottish granite, dedicated to the men from Lound who were killed in the Great War, was draped with the Union Flag for the ceremony. As the names on the memorial tell us, of its 342 inhabitants at the time Lound sent 51 of its sons to fight in that war to end all wars and only 46 of them returned.

The memorial was erected using donations from parishioners and stands on a piece of land given to the village by the Duke of Portland. Mrs Huntsman said "*Lest we forget, let us see that we keep this memorial in perfect order and honour for all time*". Today, we are grateful that this duty continues to be lovingly discharged by Dave White.

I would like to thank the villagers for the positive compliments on the progress of the garden so far. The new planting has come on well with the weather helping enormously. Many wild flowers have been allowed to flower before being cut back allowing pollinators to do their work. Brambles, nettles and goose grass are a menace, we could do without, but we will reduce the problem. The geraniums have taken over a bit this year in some beds but they are colourful and they do shade out unwanted weeds.

We will need to rethink one flower bed as the tree covering the bed is just too much of a canopy leaving little sun light and water for most smaller plants. Grass may be the answer!

We do not use any chemicals on the site. The fertility is from horse manure and our own composted materials. The unwanted weeds are removed by hand and mechanical means. The planting is being done to keep down maintenance as much as possible, but this all takes time.
